LAFITE-ROTHSCHILD

The name Lafite comes from the Gascon language term "la hite", which means "hillock". The estate is situated at the northern end of Pauillac, close to Cos d'Estournel which is just over the border in St.-Estephe. The vineyard consists of three major areas: the hillsides around the Château, the adjacent Carruades plateau to the west, and 4.5 hectares in neighboring Saint Estephe (which is entitled to the Pauillac appellation).

The well-drained soils are deep fine gravel up to 4 meters deep mixed with Aeolian sands on a bedrock of tertiary limestone. The 107 hectares of vines are planted with Cabernet Sauvignon (70%), Merlot (25%), Cabernet Franc (3%) and Petit Verdot (2%). The average age of the vines 35 years, although vines younger than 10 years old are not used in the Grand Vin. 18 hectares of vines are more than 50 years old and the oldest plot, called "La Gravière", is over 120 years old, having been planted in 1886.

Only minimal interventions of fertilizers are used. Yields are kept low and harvesting is done by hand in approximately 12 days by up to 350 pickers. Fermentation takes place half in traditional oak vats which are equipped with computerized temperature control with maceration on the skins for between 18 and 25 days. Malolactic fermentation also takes place in vats before the wine is transferred into 100% new oak barriques (the estate produces its own barrels in their cooperage) where it remains for between 18 to 20 months until bottling.



LATOUR

Château Latour manages to achieve a rare stylistic balance, in that its wines are internationally known for both their elegance and purity of fruit flavor, and for their power, muscularity and heroic longevity. Few wines age with such grace as those of Château Latour. These wines are highly tannic in youth, and are famously distinctive in the way they mature slowly, and on their own terms; stubbornly refusing to succumb to the effects of the natural passing of time. The other great hallmark of Latour is its consistency – the wines are consistently impressive, irrespective of whether the

PETRUS

Within the world of fine wine appreciation, there is something of an 'ultra-elite,' an inner-circle that few wines will ever enter. This is a group of maybe five or six, almost exclusively French wines, whose prices and reputations exceed those of all others. Petrus could be said to be the archduke of this noble assembly. In the best vintages few wines compare in terms of price or critical acclaim, these wines are best known for their power, concentration and multi-layered complexity. Petrus is the ultimate expression of the opulence and charm that right bank wines can deliver when at their best.

The vineyard is located in Pomerol on a plateau dominated by iron-rich (crasse de fer) clay soils that give the wines their structure and power. They are well drained due to a gentle slope. The clay content retains some water which reduces hydric stress and creates a cooler mesoclimate that is ideally suited to the early ripening Merlot. The average age of the vines is 45 years.

Grapes are picked early to retain acidity which provides freshness, finesse and elegance to the wines rather than baked jammy flavors that can sometimes be a result of later harvesting. Grapes are sorted twice, then destemmed and fermented in cement vats, although since 2005 two stainless steel tanks were added to the winery which has increased the options for parcel selections. Generally indigenous yeasts are used, although cultured yeasts are also considered as an option. Vinification is traditional with pumping over and malolactic fermentation taking place in tank, and the press wine is kept apart until January when the quality is assessed and up to 7% might be blended back in. The wine spends around two years in new oak with rackings every three months, fining with egg-whites and filtered only when absolutely necessary. Petrus, unusually for Bordeaux, is almost entirely Merlot as in practice Cabernet Franc is rarely included in the blend.

TAYLOR

The company was started in 1692 by Job Bearsley as a general trading company. In 1744 the Bearsley's purchased a property in the Douro Valley at Salqueiral, which was the first recorded British-owned property in the Douro Valley and still belongs to the company today. In 1816 Joseph Taylor entered the partnership. In 1836 John Fladgate joined and a few years later, Morgan Yeatman became a partner and the name became Taylor Fladgate & Yeatman. In 1893 they purchased the Quinta de Vargellas vineyard which continues to be the backbone for their finest Ports, and they became the first company to produce a Single Quinta port, Quinta de Vargellas in 1958. The company also own Quinta da Terra Feita, Quinta do Junco and Casa Nova. A recent innovation has seen the company bottle a port called Vinha Velha which comes from an old vineyard with very low yields at Quinta de Vargellas. David Guimaraens leads the wine-making team and he is also responsible for the Ports at Fonseca, Croft and Delaforce that also belong to the Fladgate Partnership. The company quickly established a reputation for being one of the finest producers of Port and they invested heavily in their business, building a new lodge in 1890 in Vila Nova de Gaia in order to mature and store their ports. The lodge, located close to the Atlantic Ocean, with a maritime climate that is ideally suited to the maturing of Port, is still in use today. The Symington family purchased W & J Graham in 1970. Currently six members of the Symington family are involved in the management of the company and continue to drive innovations and improvements in many aspects of the business.

CHATEAU LASCOMBES FROM THREE VINTAGES IN MULTIPLE CASES

One of the largest vineyards of the 1855 Classification, Château Lascombes covers around 120 hectares in the commune of Margaux. The original Château dates from the 17th century and was very much updated in the English style in the 19th century. It is truly a beautiful setting to produce fine wine. Once owned by Alexis Lichine and a group of American investors, the property is now owned by MACSF, the large French insurance group. Most vintages consist of 55% Cabernet Sauvignon, 40% Merlot, and 5% Petit Verdot, and annual production is around 250,000 bottles.

These cases were recently removed from a purpose-built temperature and humidity controlled home cellar in Kentucky. All the bottles were removed from bins and packed by Christie's staff prior to shipment to New York for sale. All levels are base of neck or better and were part of a large purchase directly from the Château.

The top of the tree is Romanée-Conti itself, a monopole (wholly owned vineyard of 1.8 hectares), La Tâche, also a monopole with 6.06 hectares. Richebourg 3.51 hectares, Romanée-Saint-Vivant 5.29 hectares, Grands Echézeaux 3.53 hectares and 4.67 in Echézeaux.



RICHEBOURG

Like many of the other vineyards in Vosne-Romanée, Richebourg originally belonged to the monastery of Citeaux. Today it is shared by a small handful of the region's best proprietors, with the largest holding belonging to the renowned Domaine de la Romanée-Conti. The vines of Richebourg average 45 years in age with many dating back to the original replanting after the War. Each of the various factors which influence a wine's character and flavor unite flawlessly in the wines of Richebourg, which are celebrated as sumptuous, opulent, and marvelously enduring. Indeed, it is unquestionably the greatest non-monopoly grand cru of Vosne-Romanée.

DOMAINE COMTE GEORGES DE VOGUE

The apex of the portfolio of vines at Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé is the seven hectares of Musigny Grand Cru. For Francois Millet, the winemaker, these stately old vines are patrician and the resultant wine is a noble old gentleman. Certainly the Musigny is as sophisticated and serious as the metaphor suggests: strong vintages suggesting a robe of rich cherry and raspberry fruit billowing over warm chocolate and a crème brûlée texture.

Stellar vintages such as 1990 and 2000 have an oriental spice element, with a spray of sumac, paprika and black pepper. Great care is taken with the production of the noble Musiany: only 3.8 hectares of the vines are used, as these are the oldest vines offering the most consistency and depth of character. The remaining vines in the parcel are used to produce a Chambolle Musiquy 1er Cru. In most vintages, therefore, only 900 or so cases of the Musigny come to market. The result is a wine to be sought out and treasured.

DOMAINE ARMAND ROUSSEAU

The Domaine was started at the beginning of the 20th century by Armand Rousseau who came from a family of vignerons and wine-merchants. He had inherited through marriage several plots of vineyards in Gevrey Chambertin in the Côte de Nuits at the turn of the century. Gradually he increased the size of the Domaine with acquisitions of vineyards in Charmes Chambertin in 1919, Clos de la Roche and Chambertin in 1920 and 1921, Mazy-Chambertin in 1937, Mazoyéres-Chambertin in 1940 and the esteemed 1er Cru Clos Saint Jacques in 1954. Following Armand's tragic death in a car crash in 1959, his son, Charles Rousseau, who had studied law and then oenology at Dijon University assumed control. Charles Rousseau instigated many improvements and investments, such as building two new cellars to increase storage capacity. Charles's son Eric and daughter Corinne have subsequently become involved at the Domaine and are responsible for producing some of the finest expressions of Pinot Noir coming out of Burgundy's world-famous Côte de Nuits.

DOMAINE MEO-CAMUZET

Domaine Méo-Camuzet was founded by Etienne Camuzet at the start of the 20th century. The domaine passed to his daughter Maria Noirot, however she did not have children, so then subsequently passed to a distant relative, Jean-Méo in 1959. The domaine is currently run by Jean-Méo's son, Jean-Nicolas. Up until the year 1988 much of Méo-Camuzet's production was leased to share croppers, the most famous and lauded of all being the great Henri Jayer.

Today Méo-Camuzet owns approximately 14 hectares of vineyards, including 3 hectares of Clos de Vougeot, 0.45 hectares of Corton and 0.35 hectares of Richebourg. The domaine's focus is on minimal intervention in the vineyard, allowing the expression of their fine terroirs to shine through in the wines, combined with low yields and strict selection of only the healthiest grapes. They produce some of the very finest wines in Burgundy, characterised by sublime concentration, intensity of aromas and flavours, and rich, powerful wines with significant ageing potential.

The domaine has a history dating back to the 1880s and the great-great-grandfather of the current winemaker, Frédéric Mugnier, who owned the winemaking business alongside a Dijon-based company that also produced aperitifs, absinthes and the like. Domaine J.F. Mugnier's renaissance began in 1985, however, which was the first vintage to be made by Frédéric Mugnier.

In 2004 Faiveley's lease on the Clos de la Maréchale ended, and a new cuverie was built. The vines are now run almost organically; there is little use of new wood and wines are bottled without fining or filtration. Musigny, the flagship wine, is produced from vines planted in 1948 and 1962.

Frédéric is the second-largest owner of Musigny, with close to three acres. It is a truly remarkable wine — rich and voluptuous with great weight and balance.

LUCIEN LE MOINE

Recently established in 1999 – this is a very small, family-run operation, run by husband and wife team Mounir and Rotem Saouma. Mounir having studied Viticulture and Oenology in Montpelier, followed by six years working in Burgundy and California, decided to create a small cellar and start crafting exquisite wines – all by hand. By the way, the name Lucien Le Moine is a sort of pen-name: Lucien means "bringer of light" and "Le Moine" means the monk – a nod to the few years Mounir spent at a Trappist Monastery. Normally made with a long élevage, the wines are neither fined nor filtered – it is recommended that all wines are decanted prior to consumption, an approach long debated in Burgundy.

The history of this Domaine stretches back to 1717 when Claude Leflaive settled in Puligny-Montrachet. The Domaine as we know it today owes its existence to Joseph Leflaive (1870–1953), who was a native of Puligny-Montrachet. As the Domaine had suffered from the phylloxera epidemic, Joseph undertook a program of replanting, extension, and enhancement. Following Joseph's death in 1953, his four children took over, creating a Société Civile d'Exploitation. Today, the Domaine is run by Brice de La Morandiere, the great grandson of Joseph Leflaive. Pierre Morey was estate manager from 1989 until Eric Remy took over in 2008.

The Domaine owns almost 25 hectares of vineyards, mainly located in and around Puligny-Montrachet. Their holdings include 0.08 hectares of Le Montrachet, 2 hectares of Chevalier-Montrachet, 1.91 hectares of Bâtard-Montrachet, 1.6 hectares of Bienvenues-Bâtard-Montrachet, and Puligny-Montrachet Premier Crus; Le Clavoillon, Les Combettes, Les Folatières and Les Pucelles. Domaine Leflaive has been biodynamic since 1997.

Winemaking follows Burgundian tradition. The wines are fermented at between 18 to 24° C, given 10 to 40 per cent light toast new oak (there is one 500-litre cask for the Montrachet), and, after 12 months, racked into stainless steel where they wait another 6 months before bottling. This is the very summit of white Burgundy. Outstanding wines that have the capacity to be very long-lived and develop richness, depth, and complexity with bottle-age.

Screaming Eagle is one of Napa Valley's smallest winery. 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

Because of the slope of shoulder it is impractical to describe levels as mid-shoulder, etc. Wherever appropriate the level between cork and wine will be measured and catalogued in centimetres.

The condition and drinkability of burgundy is less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7 cm. ullage in a 30-year-old burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for age, 3.5 to 4 cm. excellent for age, even 7cm. rarely a risk.






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
